This is not my first tornado. The first official tornado in the history of Woodbury, CT, as I understand it, hit in 2011, and took my car with it. This is different.



AN APPLE A DAY: Why You Should Get The New Shingles Vaccine

The new vaccine is Shingrix. It's approved by the Food and Drug Administration after studying 16,600 people showed it to be more effective at preventing the disease than the first vaccine, Zostavax. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends people age 50 and older, even those who received Zostavax get the new vaccine.

Many older adults are at risk for shingles which is caused by the same virus as chicken pox. Once infected with chicken pox the virus can lie dormant for decades in nerve roots. Once the immune system is weakened by stress, medication, trauma or disease one third of Americans will get shingles. As a person ages their immune system becomes weaker. The risk rises with age and by 85 half of adults will have at least one outbreak of shingles.

Studies indicate that 99 percent of American adults aged 40 or older have had chicken pox even if they don't remember. The risk for shingles infection is much lower for those who have had the chicken pox vaccination in their youth as opposed to a natural infection.

Most commonly the shingles virus infects the torso or face. It usually runs a two week course of crusty scabs that eventually disappear. For 15 percent of people shingles leaves them with chronic nerve pain that can last for months or years. More than have of the chronic nerve pain patients are over 60.

What makes the new vaccine so much better is an additive to the vaccine that boosts the immune system response to the vaccine. The old vaccine was a live virus. The new vaccine is not live virus making it available to those who already have weakened immune systems. The Shingrix vaccine shot may cause a sore arm at the site of injection. Some recipients also complained of headache and low grade fever. Check with your primary care giver to see if you are a candidate for this immunization.

Bishop Hazelwood's recent Blog

www.bishoponabike.com: What does a Bishop Do?

A short snapshot of three days.

I walk, I talk, I listen. I wish I drove less.

In the last few days, in a non-chronological order, this has been my work. I talked with several different pastors from around our synod. They had various challenges they were facing. One has a staff member who is not playing well with others and this pastor sought advice and counsel on how best to address the matter. We came up with some ideas. Another was facing the challenge of boundaries, not sexual boundaries, but professional. At what point is it appropriate to engage a colleague regarding their behavior? How do we maintain the interests of the church, even when it calls on us to put our friendship with someone at risk? Tough questions. I later heard back from the pastor, and so far so good - but it was not an easy conversation.

I met with a congregation that is in the middle of a call process, but their finances have restricted them to searching for other models of ministry. We discussed part-time pastors, part-time ministers from another tradition, lay leadership, partnering with other congregations. The conversation was honest and open. It reflected the changing times we are in, and the need to think differently about parish ministry. I walked with someone who had some very creative ideas about how to address the clergy shortage, train a new generation of ministers and offer them an experience in community. The ideas were alive, and fraught with all kinds of landmines, but suggested a new vision that is emerging.

I sat with our deans, leaders of conferences, as we learned the value of how to apply organizing principles to congregational renewal. It was challenging, thoughtful and inspiring. Our speaker framed every single step in a context of Biblical reflections. I saw hope coming to life.

In the office, I sat with our Synod Assembly planning team coordinator. We reviewed details and plans, made lists of tasks to be accomplished along with deadlines. After three hours, I returned to my office exhausted and exhilarated. I then sat and signed 60 some certificates for graduates from our coming School of Lay Ministry, and another 40 plus certificates for deacons and pastors celebrating anniversaries at our coming Assembly.

My hand in a spasm from all the signings, I headed to the car. On the way home, I listened to a pastor as we talked on the phone. She shared her sorrows and disappointments in her work. Her multiyear efforts to teach, preach and visit. Yet, so many in her congregation don't seem to care or value the teachings of Jesus.

Another conversation centered around concerns for people in the LGBTQ+ community. How can we as a church, a synod, and I as bishop, best understand, support, challenge, encourage, celebrate.

Three days. A glimpse into the work I do. In the words of a colleague of mine, "This work is relentless." True, but it is also good work.



ELCA presiding bishop's pastoral message on situation in Gaza

May 15, 2018

Like so many here in our country and around the world, I am appalled and saddened by yesterday's escalation of Israeli military action against protestors in Gaza. Many reports indicate that at least 60 Palestinians, including six children, have died and more than 2,000 have been injured as a result of Israel's disproportionate use of force. Our church will support a planned medical mission from The Lutheran World Federation's Augusta Victoria Hospital in Jerusalem to Gaza to assist the wounded.

I join Bishop Sani-Ibrahim Azar of our partner church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL), who today said:

We mourn with the families of the dead and dying and pray for the recovery of the injured. We believe that violent actions against the Palestinian civilians will hinder the potential for peace and reconciliation efforts between Israel and Palestine and will only lead to more violence and bloodshed. I endorse his call "upon the Israeli government to show restraint and to pursue negotiations with Palestinian leaders rather than choosing violent action against unarmed protestors."

Yesterday's events should also be seen in the context of the opening of the U.S. Embassy in Jerusalem. When that decision was announced late last year, I said:

This unilateral action would not support the cause of peace and a two-state solution but rather would unnecessarily create further tensions and possible violence that would make efforts to bring them back together for talks much more difficult.

I also support the ELCJHL's long-standing position, affirmed by Bishop Azar today, that "any final status agreement will include Jerusalem as a shared city for Jews, Christians and Muslims with free access to holy sites for all and that it must serve as capital of both Palestine and Israel."

Always, but especially in this time of deep distress, I urge us all to join his call to "continue to pray, advocate and faithfully work towards a peaceful and just solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict."

The 2018 New England Synod Assembly will be held at the Mass Mutual Center in Springfield, Mass. from Thursday, June 7th through Saturday, June 9th. Our 2018 theme, "Stir it Up", is what we plan to see happen across the New England Synod this coming year. We're opening ourselves to be stirred up by the Spirit. Will the Spirit of God encourage New England Lutherans to connect their faith and everyday lives? We'll be discovering how to stir up those connections so that faith may come alive in the sharing of our stories! Stir up your power, O Lord, and come!

We'll be joined by our ELCA Representative Stephen Bouman, who will guide us through the Bishop's election process that will begin Thursday afternoon shortly after the opening of assembly. The Rev. Jeff Thiemann, CEO of Portico will be with us and presenting a Keynote on Discipleship. The Rev. Carrie Smith of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Jerusalem will be preaching, as well as presenting a session on her work in partnership with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land (ELCJHL). She'll be joined by Deacon Adrainne Gray, Communications Coordinator for the ELCJHL, In addition, we will receive greetings from Aida Mansour of the Islamic Association of Greater Hartford. This year we are planning 245's, which are two hundred and forty-five second glimpses into some of the unique ministries of our congregations, new missions and experiments.



PROJECT STATUS – JUNE 2018

As we get comfortable with our beautiful new sanctuary, and other revisions to our St James space, (it's wonderful isn't it?) we need to note that an important milestone occurred in May. On May 9th, our construction loan with the Mission Invetment Fund was formally closed, and the outstanding balance converted to a long term (25 year) mortgage. We retain the attractive interest rate that was granted at the time of our initial MIF loan approval of 3.875%

We were able to pay down the loan from the peak borrowing of approximately \$590,000 with available funds from the 3 year GROW capital campaign. So the resulting mortgage is \$545,143.22, with payments starting June 1. Payments will be \$2858/month, or \$34,296/year.


We've retained enough funds in the GROW campaign account to handle the mortgage payments for about the next 2 years. But we need a game plan for the longer term. A combination of a debt reduction campaign at some point, and a "permanent" increase in our annual operating budget will be necessary. At some point the mortgage payment will become an ongoing part of our operating budget.

Stay tuned for more discussion at the June congregational meeting on June 24th.
