In Defense of the Practical Bishop

I've been enjoying a summer of reading, writing and arithmetic this summer. In the last week I came across a speech delivered in 1962 by <u>William F. Winter</u> at Centre College in Kentucky. Winter later became the governor of Mississippi, and now continues his efforts in the area of racial reconciliation through a center he founded in Jackson, Mississippi. The speech is titled, "<u>In Defense of the Practical Politician</u>." It outlines an approach to politics that was challenging then, and even more so today. Winter suggests the great value in getting things done. My favorite lines from the speech:

"In many cases, perhaps in most, the willingness to compromise involves great courage, and the more sharply defined the issues and the more deeply divided the partisans, the greater the courage that is required. Some of the most courageous public officials I know have been the quietly dedicated people of reason who have worked under the most unrelenting pressures to gain acceptance of unpopular but necessary agreements, while bombastic orators denounce them as traitors or worse."



In many ways Winter has captured for me a central theme of what it means to serve as a bishop. Winter had his convictions, as I have mine, but we both understand that in order to get things done there is a need to work with those with whom we do not agree. Compromise is not in vogue these days - in politics, religion, education, culture or little league parents. If one mentions compromise, you are considered a wimp, or worse a shill for the opposition. One of the most distressing comments I heard while attending a lecture this summer on the work of reconciliation and mediation was by the executive director of a midsize city. "The process of mediation works. The problem is getting people who are willing to participate. Our biggest challenge is not the issues that divide us, it is the fact that people don't want to participate, they'd rather hold their positions. And this is true all along the spectrum."

In 2014, I participated in a program at Duke Divinity school for new denominational leaders. During the three days of learning, we participated in a session on change theory. The basic idea was that people tend to gravitate toward one of three camps when it comes to change - resistance, pragmatics, and enthusiasts. In America, about 20% are resistors by nature, they just don't like change of any kind. Another 20% are enthusiasts, they want change on a daily basis, they love variety. But, 60% are pragmatists. These folks want to look at the options, discover the reasons and evaluate the pros and cons, all with an eye on "will it work.?"

These seemingly random paragraphs are verses in a hymn titled "In Defense of the Practical Bishop." While inwardly I am very much a mystic driven by intuitive expressions of God, I am outwardly a practical guy. I ask the questions of pragmatism, what can be accomplished and how can we do it together. On the inside I am all about the possibilities, on the outside I am all about the practicalities.

In another post, I'll have to write about the mystics, poets and prophets along with a few demons that inhabit my soul. But, that's for another day.



We Share Hope & Help after Floods & Other Disasters

Dear St. James Lutheran Church,

We have seen a tremendous amount of hope and help in the two months of our recovery response out of Southbury this spring and summer. We have now officially closed down our operations as of July 14. We were able to cut up tons of tree debris off of 198 of 317 homeowner's properties within five towns. We have saved vulnerable or financially challenged homeowners an estimated \$2,970,000 in clean up or contractor fees. There is still a tremendous amount of debris needing cleaning up from non-essential property, but we have been able to return yards to normal function again and make them safe.

We could not have done so without the generous support of many of our volunteers, our churches and friends like you.

Thank you for your generosity in this event and joining with us to be the gracious hands of our Lord Jesus Christ who first loved us.

May God richly bless you in the days ahead.

Is it possible to be Lutheran and an ecumenist? Of course, the answer is yes. The ELCA has continued the work of our predecessor churches—the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches, the American Lutheran Church, and the Lutheran Church in America all of which engaged in dialogues with other denominations. When the ELCA was born, its

DNA included the will toward unity. The 1991 Churchwide Assembly adopted "A Declaration of Ecumenical Commitment: A <u>Policy Statement</u> of the ELCA"—we were barely 4 years old.

Where did this impulse come from and why is it so deeply important to us?

We have just marked the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. We were a little restrained about celebrating because division in the church is nothing about which to rejoice. (Though when explaining this sensibility to a Roman Catholic colleague and dialogue partner, he did say the reformers' insistence on the primacy of the gospel is something to be celebrated.) It was never Martin Luther's intention to divide the church. Loathing the thought that this new movement should be called "Lutheran," he wrote: "How should I, a poor stinking bag of worms, become so that the children of Christ are named by my unholy name?"

The intent of Luther and the reformers was to give the gospel free course in the world, to make the evangelical case that it is God's good and gracious will to reconcile the world to God's self, and that this has been accomplished through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ apart from any human effort.

Early on, in 1530, the Augsburg Confession not only clarified and defended the evangelical position of the Reformation but made it clear that the reformers' work was consistent with the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church. (You should all study the confession. I know of congregations that have read and studied this and all the Lutheran Confessions found in the *Book of Concord*. Ask your pastor.)

This wasn't a departure from the Christian tradition, nor a break with the church. The Seventh Article of the Augsburg Confession laid out the basis and the possibility for church unity and a variety of expressions of how the gospel could be communicated: "For the true unity of the church it is enough to agree concerning the teaching of the gospel and the administration of the sacraments."

We all are not only connected to the same vine, but we have no life apart from that vine.

But this is really Christ's intention and the reality that we have in him. Jesus said, "I am the vine, you are the branches" (John 15:5). We all are not only connected to the same vine, but we have no life apart from that vine. In Holy Communion, we live Christ's current and our future reality that we are already one. The ELCA humbly tries to embody this truth in the <u>six</u> <u>full-communion partnerships</u> we already have with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), the Reformed Church in America, the United Church of Christ, the Episcopal Church, the Moravian Church, and the United Methodist Church.

We are scripturally, confessionally and even constitutionally wired to be an ecumenical church. This month's cover story highlights the ecumenical ministries of congregations and the work of <u>ELCA Ecumenical and</u> <u>Interreligious Relations</u>. It is possible to be Lutheran and an ecumenist.

But let me pose this—it is not possible for Lutherans to be ecumenists if we are not Lutheran. This might sound counterintuitive, but I believe it is true. If we aren't clear and conversant about the Lutheran movement's way of telling the Jesus story, if we are not clear about the grace that sets us free, if we waffle on the conviction that the reconciliation and redemption of the world is God's work and not ours, how can we enter into dialogue and relationship with other branches of the Christian tradition?

I called on us to read the Small Catechism during 2017. If you have put your copy away, dust it off and start studying.

This coming year at St James we need to focus on the operating budget. As you may know, we have run a deficit in our operating budget for the last couple of years. With added expenses of the sanctuary addition and a 25 year mortgage to deal with (even though we have remaining funds from the GROW campaign to cover these payments for at least 2019), it is essential that we build up our operating income. So we'd like everyone to think about how much of what has been committed to the GROW campaign for the past 3 years can be continued as increased support for the operating budget in 2019.

Our themes for the campaign this year will be drawn from Jesus' teachings in Matthew. We have used these before, but they deserve reading and praying about again. Read Matthew 6, 13 and 19 and look for the challenges that Jesus presents – challenges like "*Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth*...." from Matthew 6:19. Enjoy the Fall.....but think and pray about these things!


