A WORD FROM PASTOR ABBY

Dear Beloved Community of St. James

This summer, I've been invited to serve as a chaplain and guest faculty member to Pinecrest Lutheran Camp in New Jersey, to teach classes on meditation and environmental theology. If you've ever wondered what Environmental Theology is, here's a little introduction...

What is Environmental Theology?

Well, "theology" means the study of God, a deeper look at the sacred and our relationship with it. In specialized theology, certain truths are held close to the heart when pursuing an understanding of divinity. Environmental theology holds truths focused on natural creation: the fundamental belief that God made and loves the world, the history of science and evolution, the beauty of land and living creatures with the very real and painful effects of climate change. Keeping these points in mind and in heart influences the way we interact with biblical study, worship, service and outreach, internal beliefs, and external lifestyle. Functioning like an added lens, specialized theology is a unique emphasis when looking through the camera to view the world.

Is that in the Bible?

When we read the Bible as environmental theologians, we come to see Creation as its own character in our larger faith narrative. From the creation stories in Genesis, through the salvation of the Gospels, to the restoration in Revelation, earth is more than just the setting for the story. Earth is in relationship with God, too. Lovingly created through a process of time and change, God spoke inherent goodness into each form of water, air, plant, and animal. Humanity, set apart in image and purpose, was given unique responsibilities to care for the earth, to "till and keep it" (Genesis 2:15). We are not above or removed from creation – we are a part of it and God desires us to be in active relationship with it. The promises of Christ, which bring community and belonging, salvation and forgiveness, restoration and wholeness, they are not just for people but for planet.

What does that mean for us?

If we begin to think of the earth more as our responsibility and less our resource, more as our community and less our commodity, it deeply changes how we live in communion with creation. In our worship, it may carry us outside to new spaces for liturgy and praise. We may draw deeper meaning from the elements of sacraments – water, wine, and bread – as agricultural products of the land. We may find reminders of environmental theology showing up more in sermons, prayers, and Sunday School lessons. We may investigate new ways our building and activities can produce a lower carbon footprint and waste production. Flower beds along the parking lot may become a prayer garden or produce vegetables that get donated to the local food pantry. We may begin to see that the causes we fight for, the injustices we march against, all share a common connection to environment. And science is celebrated as God's revelation, not God's enemy. Environmental Theology encourages an active hope, not a passive one. It roots us back to what is most elemental in our lives. It brings our faith home to the garden, as God first create it to be.

An Apple A Day

Apple A Day: Update on Coronavirus, More Omicron Variants

Omicron has provided us with two new variants BA.4 and BA.5. They represent 13 percent of new coronavirus cases as of

6/11/22. The origin of these new variants is South Africa. A surge in South Africa in April and May fueled by these new variants caused a large wave but less than previous waves with fewer deaths. As the omicron variants before, these variants are skilled at evading the protective immunity of vaccination and previous infection.. Thus they can spread more easily than variants before them. Omicron is adept at infecting cells in the nose. The two new subvariants are replacing BA.2 as quickly as BA.2 replaced the original Omicron.

The US is averaging 100,000 new cases daily. The Northeast case rate is declining, Case rates in other parts of the US are rising, most in Southern US. The case rates are highest in Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico and Texas.

Moderna is developing a vaccine for the fall configured to offer more protection against Omicron and subvariants. Initial studies show 50-60 percent efficacy against Omicron.

Best protection against hospitalization and death from Covid-19 are vaccination, mitigation with mask wearing, distancing and washing your hands.

This bilingual STEAM school promotes a global focus on science, arts, engineering and business, blending Western and Latin American teaching methods for multi-cultural learning. Taught in a positive learning environment, the curriculum will emphasize women's rights, global relationship-building, and self-esteem, cultivating these girls' intellectual, social, and spiritual development. Because educated women are more likely to have fewer children and larger incomes, graduates will change the entire economic outlook of their village.
