## A POEM FROM PASTOR

#### Dear Beloved Community

In the line up of folktale protagonists, Goldilocks is not the first I'd select as a role model. An entitled intruder with no regard for boundaries or guest etiquette does not garnish much admiration. But the complaint that made her famous - "not too much, not too little, just right" - may carry with it some wisdom we could salvage from this fable.

After all, this is the time of year for grand expectations; resolutions that will change our lives, right the ship and finally, get us to that ideal place we aim to be. *Gym everyday, hike the Appalachian Trail, go vegan, read 25 books, finally master the world/life balance!* Resolutions, like beginnings are exciting, as they are not yet tainted by disappointment or stress. They bring us hope so we tend to be overly optimistic about them. But dreaming big can also lead to big letdowns and harsh self-criticism. Once they've cracked, we think of them as broken and toss them out entirely.

So what's the antidote? This is where Goldilocks is onto something. In the business world, they might call it "1 degree shifts." In Sweden, they call it *lagom*, which literally means "not too much, not too little." It is a philosophy of balance at every area and juncture of life. *Lagom* describes a lifestyle of both social and self awareness, moderation, and sustainability. Could this approach offer us something that actually serves and refreshes? That keeps hope in tact, makes change progressive, and offers more grace each day, even an "off" day? You *could* read 25 books or you could just read 10 minutes each evening and see what happens. You *could* go to they gym every day or you could pick 3 days this week. You *could* resolve to be your best self or you could be kind to yourself.

In our sacred scriptures, the validity of "just enough" is affirmed over and over again. Five loaves and two fish, two copper coins, a tiny mustard seed, a few drops of oil, a splash of the Jordan River - God doesn't require much to make immeasurably profound things happen. Jesus says "come as you are." You don't have to be more, and you don't have to be less. A few healthy practices - spiritual, mental, physical - sprinkled each day may serve bigger change than we calculated at the beginning.

A very wise Swedish speaker of our own congregation recently summed it up best: "Each day, our best is to be kind, be humble, be thankful. Then, we live well." Amen to that.

# An Apple A Day: Reducing Your Arthritis Risk

Pain, stiff and swollen joints are common in adults over age fifty. Arthritis is a term for more than 100 kinds of inflammatory joint conditions. Osteoarthritis is more likely to occur with aging(>age 50), especially in previously injured joints with meniscus or ligament tears. It is also more common in people who have family history of arthritis or chronic conditions of diabetes, obesity or heart disease. Staying physically active can improve physical function and quality of life. Low impact exercise, walking and stationary bicycle. Strengthening quadriceps and hamstrings help support joints. Not every option works for each person so explore which one keeps you active.

Over the counter medication of ibuprofen, Tylenol or steroid injections into a problem joint can relieve pain to varying degrees Dietary supplements such as glucosamine and chondroitin sulfate or Boswellia relieve symptoms for some people. There is not specific evidence in studies to support their benefit but for most people these supplements are not harmful. There have been many clinical trials but no conclusive information.

Find a way to stay active and healthy lifestyle. It's the best way to prevent arthritis in later years.

2024 Guatemala Mission Trip: Tree4Hope, Guatemala Hope Academy Girl's School Miguel Magone Orphanage

## What hopes do you have for yourself as a trip participant?

**Kevin:** I hope to better understand the challenges facing the students in Guatemala. When I return, I hope I can communicate what I have learned to the congregation, my coworkers, friends, and family and how they can support this effort.

Kristin: As a participant in St. James' 2024 service trip to Hope Academy, I am hoping to enhance intercultural connections between myself, the people within my community and our world community. As a second-grade dual language classroom teacher in which I support ENL learners ("English as a New Language") in becoming bilingual, biliterate and bicultural learners in both English and Spanish, I am very interested and fully support other schools that set out to teach students to be bilingual (or multilingual) learners. Many of my second-grade students have immigrated to the US from a small town in Guatemala and I'm hoping to learn more about Guatemalan culture and foster connections.

## What hopes do you have for St James as a congregation?

**Kevin:** By connecting with both the leaders and the students of the school, I hope that this growing relationship between Hope Academy and the congregation at St James can provide a human connection to the news stories we hear about from around the globe. I hope that by visiting and spending a week at the school that we can create life-long relationships that extend even to those in the congregation that were not able to make this trip.

**Kristin:** I have many hopes for St James as a congregation with this amazing partnership with Tree 4 Hope. A huge part of St. James is service. Seeing the impact that St. James has in our local community is inspiring and through this partnership with Tree 4 Hope it's wonderful to see this pillar of service extend well beyond the borders of Southbury and to all of God's people. It's my (and our) hope that this service trip will be continued for many years and accessible to anyone at St. James who is called to participate.


